

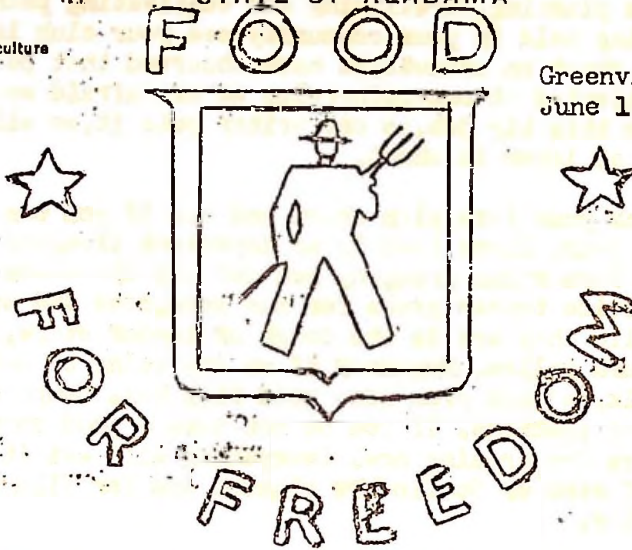

To The Colored Farm Population of Butler County:

There are several important subjects which we shall discuss briefly for your consideration and information.

1. U.S. War Bonds & Stamps: You no doubt have read in newspapers or have heard the announcement given over the Radio, that on June 9, every income-earning citizen of the United States will be called upon to pledge and invest at least 10 per cent of his income in Defense Bonds and Stamps. In line with this movement, the Chairman for Butler County has charged the Negro Agents with the responsibility of appointing Chairmen in rural areas of the county, to contact every colored farmer, (men and women), and ask them to make a pledge.

Remember no one will be asked to do more than he can do. These Chairmen will receive separate letters today, and will meet the County Chairman at the County Court House on Thursday, June 4, at 8:30 P.M., War Time (7:30 P.M. Farmers' Time) for detailed information. It is expected that every person who uses U.S. Currency as a medium of exchange will be asked to help finance the war effort. Please - keep in mind that every investment you make is an investment in "Freedom", and an investment in U.S. Savings Bonds and Stamps is the greatest investment a man can make. Our Government is expecting every patriotic citizen to do his part, and certainly farmers too can make an investment. Reverend D. B. Bennett of Mt. Zion has been asked to coordinate the movement among rural churches, and we are - confident you will do your part when called upon.

2. Farm Defense Program: Every producer of this county should have a Farm Defense

Plan Sheet. If you have not already done so, now is a good time to study this sheet. Let's look at cotton which is no. 1 on the sheet: see if you have planted your acreage allotment. If you are in doubt, consult the Triple-A office or your Beat Committeeman. If you did not use 6-8-4, applied at the rate of 400 lbs. per acre, or if you used a low grade fertilizer such as 3-8-5, then it will be necessary to side dress with about 150 lbs. of Nitrate of Soda. With the present price of cotton it pays to poison. You should make plans now for poison as the supply is limited. This is also true with fertilizer. Experience has taught - farmers to poison cotton after it is chopped out with Mop-N Dip, applied at the rate of 2 lbs. dissolved into 2 gallons of water per acre. The sirup is already added, and the farmer can make his own mop. Make plans also for about 7 lbs. per acre of Calcium Arsenate dust to be applied when cotton begins to spread, and -

Getten continued:

-be sure to apply all poison during fair weather for maximum results. For peanuts which is no.2 on the plan sheet, let's check and see if we have planted our acreage allotment for oil. The Negro agent conducted demonstrations throughout the county early this spring in planting, fertilizing and cultivating peanuts, and if you did not attend the meeting held in your community, see your club leader or county agent for the instruction sheet on peanuts. We have observed that peanuts in some sections need to be cultivated at once, otherwise we are afraid weeds and grass will cut the yield. To do this big job, as one writer puts it, we will have to work harder and longer hours as labor is short.

No.3, Livestock: Check your farm plan sheet and see if you can increase your livestock this year. Since feed is an important item, and since the pasture is the cheapest feed a farmer can grow, why not cut all the weeds and undergrowth out now so as to provide tender grass for our hogs, cows and workstock. Oats should be cut and cured while they are in the dough or tender stage, and not left in the field to scald or turn yellow. Remember if we are going to make every cow give an extra pint of milk, we must grow some good rich hay. Cowpeas and Sorghum planted behind oats is a good practice. If you do not have a good chance of Soybeans, substitute with Kudzu for grazing now. Everything will eat it including chickens. A few extra acres of corn or Sunflowers planted now for Silage will increase milk production this winter.

No.4, Poultry: There are at present over 300 Lamp Brooders on Negro farms of this county, and farmers and 4-H club boys are ordering baby chicks as rapidly as possible. Enoch Carter of the Mt. Rose 4-H club has recently built a Brooder and has purchased 18 young Turkeys from the Poultry Division of Tuskegee. Roosevelt Shavers of the Garland 4-H club has learned how to make a Lamp Brooder during the Short Course at Tuskegee along with many other things, and is now helping farmers with construction in his community. Mr. Cleve Johnson of Pine Top has recently made a Brooder and purchased 110 baby chicks, of these he has raised 103, and is now realizing dividends from his project. There are numerous others that are doing likewise, but time will not permit us to describe them. Sanitation, plenty of grazing and space are essentials in poultry raising.

No.5, The Home Garden: Most of our spring gardens are beginning to fade away, and what are we going to do for vegetables during July, August and September? This is a critical period for the garden in that weeds, grass and insects are prevalent. To remedy this condition, you should select your summer garden where there is a reasonable amount of moisture, and plant practically everything you planted this spring. Plantings of tomatoes, eggplants, Peppers, butter beans, collards, rutabagas, turnip mixture and Irish potatoes can be planted just as soon as the seedbed is prepared. Save small potatoes for seed this summer. Use 4-10-7 under root crops or 6-8-4 for both roots and tops. For biting insects, use Sulphur Dust with 75 per cent Rotenone, commonly referred to as Derris. For sucking insects use Black Leaf-40 at the rate of 1½ teaspoons to one gallon of scapy water. Barnyard manure applied liberally will do wonders.

No.6, Sugar for Canning: Due to the fact that we cannot buy as much sugar as we did last year for canning, we will have to plan to conserve more fruit by drying. Everyone will be given some sugar for fruit preservation. For every four quarts of finished fruit to be canned you will be given 1 pound of sugar. To get your sugar for canning, it will be necessary for you to register again about ten days before canning season. Watch your local newspaper for details. The colored strawberry Association of Garland reports that they have realized a better income from berries this year than in recent years. This is gratifying, and certainly if we all do our best, we can look forward for a greater reward for our labor.


Dear Dr. Evans:

Dear Mrs. Rowan,

The Home Demonstration work in Wixon is effectively demonstrated by Mrs. Griffith, whose home you probably had in mind to visit. Mrs. Griffith, has a home made lamp brooder made under my supervision which has been used successfully in raising all their Spring chickens and turkeys. The brooder has a glass window and has been used as a guide for making brooders for all of Brazos County clients, since the observation made by the White H. S. A. Supervisor.

In Wellborn, Mrs. K. E. Dangerfield, yard demonstrator, is a very pleasing hostess; her husband, has terracing demonstrations of note.

The Farm Agent and I should be pleased to have the guest visit the Mary Francis Bradley demonstration in Cannan, who has a good home food supply demonstration the year around.

Mrs. E. B. Smith of Roans Chapel, has a poultry demonstration that supports her family; I have asked her to bring her record and if time permits the party could see a nearly complete example of live-at-home. She keeps on hand, canned port chops, etc. the whole year.

Mr. Sanders and Mr. Williams are desirous of having dinner in the country, does it please you for me to arrange to serve the group out? Mr. Sanders and I have agreed to share the cost.

The menu that I planned includes a variety of Brazos County home food supplies.


Dear Agents:
