During this period, I contacted 15 leading Neuro farmers and ranchers, all of whom were enthusiastically in favor of the movement. I also had a conference with Judge Chambers and he, too, expressed himself as being in favor of making the appropriation, but seemed to doubt that the Commissioners would have the same idea. The drawback, according to Judge Chambers, was due to the lack of funds.

I need not tell you that these farmers need close guidance now more than any other time in many years, and imagine as this is one of the times we have ample state and federal funds for expansion, I think we should get the appropriation if possible.

I regret that I did not get to see you while in Victoria, but I do want you to know that we have been driving at and surely hope that you can see your way clear to render us assistance in this matter.

No doubt, I will be n Victoria again soon and I shall try to arrange my visit so as to be sure to see you.



TO EACH COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT IN THE SOUTHERN DISTRICT

Dear Co-worker:

The recent rains over the district brings to each agent the responsibility of rendering each farmer information that will enable him to take full advantage of conditions influenced by the moisture.

I hope that you will bear in mind that your major responsibility in the war effort is to assist the farmer to increase economically the war essentials, Food, Feed, Poultry, Dairy Products, Meats, and Oils. The production during the next 60 days will determine how well this program will succeed.

I am making the following suggestions: (1) See that all cultivated land continues to grow economical plants. Plant: sorghums:schrock kaffir, golden rod, for late syrup, Red top, Amber, etc. Maise and Hegaria, and Feterita are not recommended, sudan for hog and cow feed. Peanuts: corn middles, and on other vacant land. These peanuts will make excellent fall feed. Peas: Any and all kinds in corn muddles and anywhere. Fall Green Manure and Soil Building Crops: Time to draw plans and prepare ground. Gardens: Time to clean up and fertilize. Plan your planting for fall now. Plant peas and butter beans. Livestock: See that all livestock has shade, and cool water. Try to finish as many market hogs for September or early October market. Poultry: Cull old hens; stop at nothing to provide green feed. Don't ween the pullets if you want fall eggs. Orchard and Fruit Plots: Clean the land and practice clean cultivation the balance of the year. This will cause them to make stronger fruit buds and bloom later in the Spring. Sweet Potatoes: Plant vines on well prepared land.

There is still time to bud pecan and fruit trees. These are just a few suggestions of the things that need looking after at this time.







- 4. Please give me the address of the company in New Orleans carrying awls, needles, wax, thread, etc. If you have two or three cow hides already tanned for sale, or one kindly advise me and give price.

We are putting on a "Victory" Campaign very soon and the leather work will be greatly stressed during this Campaign.

I am of the opinion that if you would can these smaller hides by one of the chrome methods, it would come nearer to serving your purpose. You see chrome strangthers the hide, the alum bath does not.

1. It would be o. k. to make harness with thin leather if chromed. You may have to double some pieces

2. The saddle soap should be applied after dying.

The soil should be applied after dying.

I do not have the address of a company in New Orleans carrying the equipment you need. The best company near you is at Montgomery, and you can get this address from the Agricultural Department at Tuskegee; if they do not have it, I am sure the institute's shoe shop department can give it to you.

Dear Mrs. Rowan:

At this time I am unable to give you a complete report on the Cotton Mattress and Comfort Program, due to the way the program is handled in this county. According to the county setup, all supplies, material, finance, reports from community chairman and records are handled by the County Home Dem. Agent. My records and reports are taken from her office. She stated that at present she is unable to an accurate report and went be until about August 15th. I will be able to give a complete report after that time.

I am making a partial report on the program, giving the following information:

All applicants who were eligable were supplied with mattresses. All applicants have received one or more comforts, but not a comfort for each mattress in many cases where there were two or more mattresses to the family.

There are approximately 200 comforts yet to be made by Negro applicants. Centers are now at work and will complete about Aug. 10th. All mattresses have been completed and no mattress material on hand.

There are nine mattress and comfort making centers in the county. The Negro County Agri. Agent has been responsible for the educational part of the program.

If there is any more information needed please notify me. I will give a complete report as soon as it can be accurately obtained.
