



We are planning a pig show for October 31th, at which time you are expected to show your hog or your sow and pigs. It is expected that these amimals will be in first class show condition. The expect to pay good prizes for the best animals in the show. I am trying to arrange it so every boy who enters a hog in the show will recieve a prize, but every boy <u>must</u> see to it that his hog or hogs are in the show.

There will be three classes of hogs in the show. 1st sows and litters, 2nd boars, and 3rd fat hogs. Gilts that have not been bred before September 1st will be shown as fat hogs.

TARNING-- Do not feed your sow too much rich feed just before or just after she prings pige. Too much rich feed might cause your sbw to have milk fever.

Be sure you are able to handle you hog as that will be considered by the judges in making placements. It might be well for you to come to your county agent for tips on preparing your hog for the show.

Each boy is expected to have a 6'X6' pen to show your hog exhibit in. Be sure to start working on your hog now, so yours might be the best in the show.


