Deer Lires

Alton E. Adams, Regro County Agri. Agent of Ft. Bend County in our (Extension Service) opinion at this time is more valuable to the war effort as County Agent and leader of Regro farmers in Ft. Bend County, than he would be if he was in the Military Services.

Adams is responsible in no small degree in assisting farmers in reaching production goals as outlined by the war Board. As you may recall, Pt. Bend County exceeded these goals by 20%. Since 1/3 of the population of the county is Regroes, they played a definite part in this increase.

We are of the opinion that, without this leadership during the first six months of this year when the planning will get under way, this production will becline.

Adams has also, been trulned in Civilian Protection for Fort Bend County.

We regret that there are no replacements for Negro County Agri. Agents entering the Military Services and unless some trained men come to us who have been discharged as physically unfit, counties going off now will probably not have agents for the duration.

In the light of the foregoing facts, I recommend that the Commissioners Court recommend that A. B. Adams be placed in Class II-A and defered for six (6) months.

Dear Mr. Williams:

I suppose you have begun to think that I have adopted you, without your consent, to cry on your shoulder and seek advice from.

Mr. Williams, I am in need of a favor, and I do not know to whom I could go. I am writing to ask if you will please be a co-signer on a note for \$100.00, with my sister, for me. I can secure the money from a personal loan department of a local bank here for educational purposes. But I want the money to accept a recent assignment to a position as Junior Typist in Washington at \$164.00 per month. I have been handicapped in saving something for such a day by working at such a low salary and trying to go to school. Hence I am completely broke. This is the big moment I have been waiting for and I hope you will grant me the favor in order that I may accept. I am allowed 1 year to pay the money back with \$8.00 interest. I need enough money to carry me over until pay day 30 days later.

There has been a time that I could go to Mr. Luper for such a favor, but the recent turn of affairs makes me know it would not be wise. And, too, I haven(t disclosed my plans to any one yet.

I am to give the Civil Service Board an answer Saturday, January 30, as to whether or not I can accept the position. I took the examination on January 19, and have just received my assignment, I had no idea that I would receive it so soon. If I had been successful in receiving a small raise I, perhaps, could have saved something toward this end, and ask for a 30 day deferrment but salaries have been frozen as of December 31, 1942.

Please, may I have a favorable reply from you by January 30. Should this letter reach you later than that day, I will still appreciate a favorable reply.

I assure you that I shall always come up to your expectation and the confidence you place in me by making payments promptly. And I will always be frateful to you for giving to an opportunity to accept such a position. Mr. Williams, should you fail me, I don't know what I will do. I can't continue working here for this salary, and this is an opportunity that happens once in a life time. I realize that this is a bit contrary to your rules, but please allow me a chance. I will not betray your confidence.
