This month two members of the livestock sub-committee assisted with giving prospective 4-H swine demonstrators information on conducting good swine demonstrations.

Ed Mathis of St. Paul community and Vance Hilliard of Rock Island community made visits to two homes where 4-H'ers are engaged in swine projects. Along with these leaders were four 4-H'ers who are starting swine projects for 1961.

Good points as well as bod points were discussed with these boys. This phase of work was brought about as results of leaders having an opportunity to observe swine demonstrations conducted by 4-H'ers and adults in previous years.

It was noted that in these observations that many errors could be omitted if pointed out to new demonstrators at an early date. also decided that leaders in other communities would give this type of assistance to other 4-H boys in their respective communities.

One of the major problems confronting beef cattle producers is that of feeding. This matter was discussed extensively in a meeting held by thirteen cattle producers including members of the livestock sub-committee on November 14th at the home of Hope Mosley of Second Corinth community.

Outlook information on cattle prices was given to this group and it was pointed out that more profit could be obtained on a farm by utilizing home grown feeds for feeding livestock rather than placing feed directly on the market and that well fed cattle are more profitable than poorly managed cattle.

These facts were brought out by Alonzo Bragg when he discuss facts concerning a demonstration he conducted on feeding fifteen calves and making a comparasion with eleven calves that were sold from the pasture.



The Negro County Agricultural Agent attended a short-term Regional Graduate session at Prairie View A. & M. College and found that courses offered there provided practical help for further improving the work with rural colored families in the county.

While attending the school, the agent studied Rural Sociology and Financial Management. These courses were designed to give the kind of practical extension training which will contribute to the development of more effective methods of serving farm and urban people.

The local agent was one of 95 Extension Workers from seven States and five African countries enrolled in the graduate session.

In addition to the courses, the workers took part in an agricultural seminar, visited a large ranch, and went on an educational tour to Monterrey, Mexico. Those who studied rural sociology made a visit to the Waller County ourthouse in Hempstead, Texas for a tour of the c courthouse and to hear a lecture on county government by the Honorable John C. Winfree, County Judge.

Dr. J. L Brown of Prairie View and Dr. Ben Cook of Texas A. & M. College directed the session. The teaching staff came from the University of Arkansas, the University of Georgia, Texas A. & M., and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

In order to create interest among people, the 4-H'ers and adults listed the hazards that were common with the people in the county. Some of the hazards that the people listed were: Men and boys riding atop of loaded hay trucks and loaded watermelon trucks; riding tractors on farm roads after dark without lights; no outside lights on the farmstead to provide good visability on steps and outside area; overloading electrical circuits; unlabled bottles and other centainers; loaded guns at hand reach; unguarded power belts and pulleys and many other hazards listed which helped them to recognized dangers about the farm and home.

This was done with the people finding these dangers themselves so that they may have a better understanding and be aware of the many hazards about them that they come in contact daily.

This month four days were devoted to production of cotton. During meetings throughout the yrar, leading cotton producers have expressed the need for better insect control on cotton as it had been pointed out that production of cotton has been cut as low as 50% because of not controlling insects.

During the growing season Wade Palmer of Sunnyside community,
Ed Scott of Prairie View community, Licoln Gooden of Lewisville community
and Leonard Andrews of Pattison community darried out recommendations
and recommended practices on spraying cotton to control insects. Check
strips were left to determine results.

One of the major lessons taught in these practices was how to determine when it is necessary to spray cotton. This month these fields were checked and it was found that where insects were controlled cotton produced from 25% to 50% more.

This training was given in three communities, Brookshire, Prairie View and Waller to boys who are conducting swine demonstrations in the Sears swine program.

One of the major problems among 4-Hers and farmers is the high mortality rates in pigs at farrowing time.

This Thishmonth 4-H demonstrators had three gilts to farrow.

This served as good material to teach these boys and one leader, L. C. Moosley, who made one visit with the agent how to care for sow and litter during hot weather.
